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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Shri Sharda Bhavan Education Society's Yeshwant Mahavidyalaya, Nanded, established in 1963 is a Coeducation institution situated in the urban region of Nanded city, in Maharashtra. The college has been at the service of 'students from rural-background' for 60 years. It offers both Grants-in aid with UGC 2f and 12 (B) and Self-financing 05-UG, 15-PG, 19-Research programs, 07-Certificate, 12-Add-on and 05-Value Added courses, 05-Diploma and 02-PG Diploma Courses to around 5,000 students across the region. College is accredited at A grade by NAAC three times, and is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded.

College received **UGC CPE** status twice in the 10th and 11th plan of UGC, New Delhi, and is **DST-FIST** sponsored institution. It has been **NAAC mentor institute** guiding five mentee college of the region to go for NAAC Accreditation under **UGC-Paramarsh-scheme** of New Delhi (from 11 September 2019 to 11 September 2022); College is approved by NAAC under **Margadarshan-Scheme** to mentor three institutions in the District to help them go for NAAC Accreditation. College executes the activities of **Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Scheme** of the government of India and accordingly adopted five villages across the region, with the vision of enabling higher educational institutions to work with the people of rural India for transformational change.

Teaching-Learning-evaluation is online/offline which is experiential and participative; One Patent has been granted and 03 patents have been published; developed 3 software through incubation centre; students have participated in RD Parade and have joined Indian Army.

Institution is the recipient of **Jagar Janivancha** by the Maharashtra State first prize for the Gender-equality initiatives. It is also the recipient of the **IGNSS-Best-Program-Officer-Award** and **IGNSS-Best-College-for-NSS Award**. Institution is recognized as the **Best College** during 2020-21 for the second time; **Best Teacher Award** during 2020-21 for the second time; **Best NSS Student Award** (2020-21), Second **Best magazine award** (twice) by the affiliating University; State level **Best Magazine award** (2020-21) in the Marathwada region by Yeshwantrao Chavan Prathisthan, Mumbai.

Institution is the proud recipient of 'One District one Champion' Award from MGNCRE, Union Ministry of Education, under SAP 2020-21, for the Green initiatives on the campus.

In the post-independence India, after the police action in 1948, Hyderabad State came under the jurisdiction the Government of India and on the reorganization of the state in 1956, Marathwada became a part of bilingual state of Bombay; from 1st May 1960, Marathwada has been a part of the state of Maharashtra. After the formation of Maharashtra State on May 1, 1960, Yeshwant Mahavidyalaya, Nanded was established in June 1963. The academic background of the region of Marathwada was comparatively meagre and it was known as a Socio-economically backward region. In view of this background, the college has been striving to fulfil the

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Vision 'to dispel the darkness from the lives of the poor' through education.

Institution strives in maintaining core values of education by contributing to national development through fostering global competencies among students not only by inculcating a value system among students but also by promoting the use of technology with a quest for excellence in all spheres of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular endeavours.

Institution offers UG, PG, PG Diploma Certificate and Research Programs along with a wide academic flexibility to UG, PG and Research Students in Humanities, Commerce & Management and Science disciplines through CBCS and Semester Pattern. Two Bridge Courses are offered to UG first year students. It has developed its own bench marks in TLE by making 21 policies and 11 guidelines for maintaining and sustaining of quality parameters on the campus.

Institution has 33 classrooms, 44 labs, 4-smart classrooms, 10-classrooms with LCD, 2-Seminar halls and 1-Conference hall, an auditorium and an amphitheatre; 4-mobile-LCD-projectors and 2 K-Yan moving projectors. The institution has subscribed CISCO- WEBEX online platform to facilitate ICT use in TLE during the COVID -19 situation and thereafter. It has Language-lab, Commerce-Lab, Mathematics-Lab and 3 Computer Science-Labs along with the Browsing centre of the library. The Sate-of-the art Indoor Sports Complex is open to the Society institutions and the public.

College attempts to make quality the defining element of HE through promotion and sustenance initiatives and aims at translating its vision into action plans.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The Vision of National Education Policy, to provide high quality education to develop human resources in our nation as global citizens, is well taken by the institution. A discussion among the faculty members was initiated on the key principles of NEP. Dr. Ajay R. Tengse, Department of English is on the NEP Committee at the Maharashtra State. Dr. Ganeshchandra Shinde, Principal and Dr. L. V. Padmarani Rao, IQAC coordinator are member of NEP at the University level. Many awareness camps and meetings have been conducted regarding NEP features in the college. The college has started preparing IDP also and a separate committee is working on it. NEP Committee is established with

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Dr. L. V. Padmarani Rao as the Nodal Officer and 6 members for implementing NEP on the campus. Accordingly, one National Webinar and one National Seminar were organized on the campus. • A national webinar on NEP 2020 was organized by UBA Cell and the Department of Commerce on 21 January 2022. • IQAC organized a NAAC Sponsored One Day National Seminar on "The Role of National Education Policy in the Re- Accreditation Framework of Higher Education" (NEP_RAF_HE 2022) on 23 May, 2022. In view of the NEP, the institution has adopted the CBCS pattern for UG PG in addition to the existing inter/multidisciplinary research and academics to transform itself into a holistic multidisciplinary institution. The speakers at the meets spoke on the multidisciplinary aspects and the college decided to map the Courses from multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary point of view and the work is in progress. Based on the output of Meetings, College decided to go for a Teaching University (TU) from the next academic year onwards in the IQAC meeting and the same is passed in the CDC meeting with the Management of the institution. In TU proposal all efforts will be made to introduce few new multidisciplinary programs such as 'Design', 'Food Technology', 'Theatre' etc In addition to 05 Career Oriented Courses, 02 PG Diploma, 07 Add-on Programs and 05 Value Added Programs offered, the institution plans to add a few more 'Discipline Specific VAC' and job fetching 'Add-on Course' through industry linkage. The institution established an incubation center, Central Instrumentation center; inter collegiate linkages, industry-academia MoU to attain quality education and move towards the attainment of a holistic and multidisciplinary education. The institution is making all necessary efforts to strengthen all multidisciplinary aspects of HE by offering flexible and innovative curricula in Humanities, Commerce and Science Disciplines that includes credit-based courses and projects in the areas of community engagement and service, environmental education, and value- based programs towards the attainment of a holistic and multidisciplinary education. The college has strengthened consultancy services in multidisciplinary aspects such as soil testing unit for the local farmers, water analysis, Chemistry, environmental related and SDG related aspects by

	testing more soil samples, water samples etc. One dedicated person with M. Tech. in Chemical Engg. takes care of the CIC.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal has now been integrated into the nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform and is currently live for the academic year 2021. The institution preparedness in implementation of Academic Bank of Credits depends upon the guidelines of the affiliated university and Higher Education Department, and the affiliating university. For this purpose, a centralized database along with the database of the college is to be established to digitally store the academic credits earned by the students from various courses so that the credit earned by students previously could be forwarded when they enter into the program again. For monitoring ABC, proper technical support system is to be created. Yeshwant Mahavidyalaya, Nanded follows a choice-based credit system for all of its programs and resolved in IQAC to go for ABC and CDC passed the resolution. Mr. Mahamune, the IT and Website Management in charge is the coordinator of ABC registration. The institution has mailed a detailed procedure to enroll for ABC to all the students. Students also are made aware through whatsapp video developed by the college, made on ABC registration. More than 90% of the students are registered on the ABC portal till date.
3. Skill development:	Yeshwant Mahavidyalaya, Nanded is already conducting the skill courses as designed by affiliating university from Semester 3 to 6 in all UG programs of Humanities, Commerce and Sciences. The institution offers the following to the students of all disciplines on the campus, along with the regular under graduation and post-graduation programs: • 05 Career Oriented Courses: Fashion Designing, Financial Accounting, Communicative English, Water Quality Management and Floriculture; • 02 Vocational Programs in TPP and PG Diploma in Embedded Systems Design; • 07 Add-on Programs: Jewellery Designing, Biofertilizer Production, Introduction to Mathematical Software, Ornamental Fish Farming, Sophisticated Instrumental Analysis, Indian Light Classical Music, Basics of Embedded System Design, • 04 computer literacy programs: Basic Literacy Certificate Course in Cyber Crime & Cyber Security, Foundation of CS & IT, Mobile

Application Development, Let's Begin with Python Programming; and • 05 Value Added Programs: Employability Skills, Yoga & Health, Human Rights, Soft Skills, Know Your Self. The focus is towards integrated knowledge acquisition and upgrading human skill towards creating a new league of employable youth. The COC programs offer freedom to students where each exit point is linked to a specific job role; Students who successfully complete the Certificate of the programme will be eligible for Diploma and those who complete the Diploma are eligible for Advanced Diploma. Students also are free to do many Certificate Courses, one each year. Each of the Certificate courses/Programs is a 2 credits structure and in the beginning of the academic year, through the printed prospectus, website notices, orientation lectures and induction programs to ensure that interested students take at least one vocational course before graduating. Programs like 'Soft Skills', 'Human Rights', 'Know Your Self' offered by the institution are providing Value-based education to inculcate positivity, scientific temper, citizenship values, and also life-skills among the learners. TPP and PG Diploma in Embedded Systems Design engage the services of Industry veterans and Master Crafts persons to provide vocational skills and overcome gaps vis-à-vis trained faculty provisions. The institution is planning to offer vocational education in ODL/blended/on-campus modular modes to Learners. The COC, Value Added Programs are Skill oriented courses and are offered to students through online mode on Google classroom and/or distance mode. Offering Certificate courses are good practices of the institution pertaining to the Skill development in view of NEP 2020 and Such Courses of the college could be incorporated in the relevant 4 year Degree Programs soon as we transform into TU.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Dr. L. V. Padmarani Rao is undertaking MA in Indian Knowledge System from BHISHMA INDIC STUDIES. As an outcome, the department of English initiated a webinar series on 'Indian Knowledge Systems' which organizes two webinars on the topic per year (One per semester). Accordingly, a one day National Webinar on "Indian Knowledge Systems: Bhagawad Gita: Worldly Wisdom" by Prof. Gauri Mahulikar from Ernakulam, Kerala on 29th

December 2021; a one day National Webinar on "Indian Knowledge Systems: Indian Poetics- Bharata Muni's Natya Shastra (IKS-IP-BM-NS 2022) By Prof. Amith Kumar from EFLU, Hyderabad on 18th May 2022; and a one day National Webinar on "Indian Knowledge Systems: Chanakya's Arthashastra (IKS-CA-2022)" by Prof. Ashwini Manthalkar on 15 October 2022 were organized for students, teachers and researchers. 'Know yourself' (KYS) is a unique Value Added program offered by the department of English with the incorporation of seven-chakras, tri-Gunas, Four-Yogas and the like which is well appreciated by the participants. The department of English offers a Value added Program in ancient Indian traditional knowledge titled as "Indian Knowledge Systems" from 2022-23 onwards. The institution encourages learning of national language of Hindi and the local language of Marathi and traditional Indian languages like Urdu and Sanskrit by offering Under Graduate programs in Hindi, Marathi, Urdu and Sanskrit. The subjects of Humanities and Commerce are offered in Marathi medium also to promote Indian languages and for the ease in understanding the subject for the students. Programs including webinars and seminars are offered to encourage the regional language Marathi and Hindi learners. Extra-Curricular and Co-Curricular activities for the students are organized in Marathi and Hindi to understand the cultural values permeated by the literary works in Marathi and Hindi. Further, Indian History, Indian Politics, Indian Administration, Indian Economy and Business Ethics in the curriculum teach cultural values in Indian tradition so that students imbibe value orientation. Indian Writing in English, Indian Poetics papers being offered in PG English introduces the students to the contemporary Indian writers in English. All faculties are well trained to provide the classroom delivery in bilingual mode (English and vernacular) The Department of History offered a certificate course for one month to the faculty and the students in Modi script. Spiritual Education Committee organizes lectures and webinars related to the Knowledge systems of spiritualism Centre for Community Development (CCD) organizes capacity building programs, Skill development programs for the local community, collaborative study of folk tales, temples, forgotten recipes in the region and the

like to promote Indian Culture and traditions. Frequent field trips of the Department of History to local heritage sites/museum to value their culture and traditions and to create awareness amongst students. The College plans to offer Degree Program in IKS once it is transformed into TU.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Yeshwant Mahavidyalaya, Nanded offers 05 Undergraduation and 15 Post-Graduation and 19 Research programs on its campus. All these programs are offered as outcomes-based education (OBE) which are designed keeping in mind the regional and global requirements. The institution has implemented outcome-based education with clearly stated Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes of the affiliating University. All courses are designed with outcomes centered on Bloom's Taxonomy's cognitive abilities namely Remembering, Understanding, Applying, Analyzing, Evaluating and Creating. Apart from the domain-specific skills, learning outcomes at all levels ensure social responsiveness and ethics, as well as entrepreneurial skills so that student contributes proactively to economic, environmental and social well-being of the nation. The Course Objectives (COs) are also aligned to the PO-PSO philosophy. All course syllabus have been designed with due consideration to macro-economic and social needs at large so as to apply the spirit of NEP. The institution website has the updated Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of each program and course published as a good practice of the institution pertaining to the Outcome based education (OBE) in view of NEP 2020. All the necessary efforts are being taken to come out with specific guidelines on attainment of COs and POs; the college has organized a workshop on attainment of Cos and POs.

6. Distance education/online education:

The institution offers UG and PG Programs of Yeshwantrao Chavan Open University, Nashik on its campus and encourages Distance Education and accommodates most of the students of the districts in under-graduation programmes like—B.A. and B.Com (English/Marathi medium), post-graduation programmes like—M.A. (English, Hindi, Marathi), M.Com. As per the increasing demand of the students, center has recently started post-graduate programmes in Science like—M.Sc. Botany, Zoology

and Chemistry and in Humanities like—M.A. Urdu, Economics and Public Administration. The center is contributing immensely to provide dual degree opportunities to the students. The institution is the local chapter of NPTEL and offers SWAYAM courses to the faculty and students as part of Online Education. Faculties are encouraged to offer MOOC courses at YMN campus which promotes the blended learning system. Due to Covid -19 pandemic, educational institutions in the country have got increasingly involved in using the digital platforms for engaging classes, conducting conferences and meetings. The institution is already prepared, especially during COVID-19 pandemic situation, 100% teaching learning process through different online modes like Cisco WebEx, Zoom, Google classrooms, Google Meet, what's App etc. The college has subscribed CISCO- WEBEX online platform for facilitating teaching, learning and evaluation on the campus. In post COVID-19 pandemic situation, the teaching is both online and offline, thus helping the students to study e-content for all subjects of all semesters. Opening up of the economy including that of educational institutions has paved the way of adopting hybrid mode of education called as 'PHYGITAL' combing online and offline resources. This can be considered as the new normal, which is envisaged in New Education Policy as well. Due to the experience gained during the closure period of Covid-19, access to online resources by educators and students will not be a constraint anymore. The institution has an e-content policy made by the E-content development cell & IQAC and accordingly, the faculty is motivated to develop e-content based on the UGC 4 quadrant Model, so as to make available all such type of econtent material prepared by faculty members to all students through online mode to meet the future challenges. The institution plans to explore the possibilities of offering vocational courses through ODL mode in the institution. The college encourages students to go for Dual Degree, Twin Degree and Double Degree by arranging awareness camps. As the college is consecutively 'A' grade for three times, it is eligible to offer such programs in collaboration with other universities.

Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy

1. Whether Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) has been set up in the College?

With the initiative of the Political Science, NCC and NSS, Electoral Literacy Club titled as EGALITE CLUB is set up with the primary objective of sensitizing the student community about democratic rights which includes casting votes in elections. We organize various programs which create awareness regarding electoral procedures. We conduct mock polling activities to give the experience-based learning of the democratic setup. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Transparent Internal Assessment:

- The Internal Examination Peer Committee (IEPC) of the institution coordinates the internal examinations comprising of unit tests, assignments, seminar presentations and pre-semester examination on complete syllabus before the commencement of the summative CBCS university external examination.
- Through the Academic Calendar prepared at the beginning of academic year students know tentative dates of class tests well in advance and can plan studies accordingly.
- Appropriate time-gaps are maintained between successive internal tests.
- Some additional surprise internal tests are conducted.
- Question papers for internal exams are prepared according to the university examination pattern by individual faculty teaching the same Course.
- Answer sheets of all internal exams are evaluated and shown to the students for maintaining the transparency in marks given. In-class discussion, the expected answers are discussed after the test for the improvement of students' performance. Model answer paper is displayed & discussed with students.
- For assessment of students' seminars and projects, concerned teachers prepare a suitable schedule of student presentations in consultation with the HoD and the same is communicated well in advance to students.

Transparent External Assessment:

- Consolidated marks of the unit tests, assignment and seminar are submitted by each department to the university as the component of continuous assessment.
- The institution is the biggest centre to conduct the university examination on its campus.
- The institution is also the Central Assessment Program Centre (CAP) of the university to conduct the external evaluation of the students.
- The faculty of other institutes evaluate the masked Semester end papers of students for maintaining transparency in assessment and evaluation.
- Teachers of the college promptly participate in the external evaluation as per university orders and assess the answer sheets by adhering to respective model answer papers to maintain transparency.
- The Institutional mechanisms for minimization of grievances in internal evaluation involve following:
 - Except for some occasional surprise tests, all internal evaluation is done by following a predeclared schedule so that students get enough time for preparation.
 - Separate exam and evaluation is arranged for students who are unable to attend the unit test due to unavoidable reasons.
 - Results of internal tests are declared within time and students are shown their assessed answer sheets for getting an idea of their performance
- There is a three tier mechanism for Grievance redressal regarding internal evaluation.
 - Grievances are resolved by the concerned teacher. If any discrepancy is found in the total of marks or marks given for answer of any question, that is resolved; otherwise, the students

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are given explanation about their concern.

- If students are still not satisfied, they can approach the Head of the respective Department who, in consultation with the concerned teacher, tries to resolve the matter.
- Despite this, if there are some issues that students feel are unaddressed, there is IEPC to take care of such matters
- For student grievances about external evaluation in university end-term examinations, the college supports students by providing all facilities of submitting revaluation forms, getting photocopies of attempted answer sheets u/s 48(5)(a) of Maharashtra State Public Universities Act 2016.

- Whenever there is a change in curriculum by the affiliating university or by the college, the specific Course and Programme Outcomes change and accordingly the respective teachers are communicated about the changes in the outcomes. At the very beginning of any course, respective teachers make students aware of intended outcomes.

Teachers make the students realize the attainment of respective outcomes after those parts in the curricula are completely covered. True attainments come in when students grasp the concepts and implement them properly.

- This is also supposed to be reflected in behaviour and attitude change of the students.
- To evaluate this higher level attainment, teachers keep interacting with students regularly, by which they can judge students' individual progress.
- Performance of students in internal and university examinations is constantly monitored and analyzed.
- Feedback of stakeholders serves as crucial input in determining the extent of attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes.

In addition to this, after the students pass out by completing a program, their progression to higher studies and their placements are the two main parameters which help in evaluating the attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes.

The Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are accomplished through curriculum. Course Outcomes (COs) are defined for each course and they are mapped to POs and PSOs

Knowledge, Problem analysis, Design/development of solutions, Conduct investigations of
complex problems, Modern tool usage, The graduate and society, Environment and sustainability,
Ethics, Individual and team work, Project management and finance, Life-long learning are the POs
while the course outcome as defined as per Bloom's Taxonomy of Remember, Understand, Apply,
Analyse, Evaluate and Create are understood by every teacher on the campus and also displayed on

the website as well as maintained in the file.

• The students are well informed time to time. All the courses together must cover all the POs (and PSOs). For a course we map the COs to POs through the CO-PO matrix.

Methods for Assessment, Evaluation and Measurement of POs/PSOs Program Outcomes:

1. Direct Assessment methods

- *Continuous Assessment*: COs are assessed through Sessional & Assignment Examinations, Home Assignments and Lab records. The COs are mapped against each question and CO analysis is carried out by faculty for each course. The contribution of COs are assessed in high, moderate and low levels, towards the attainment of POs/PSOs.
- **Semester-end Theory Examinations:** The questions in semester-end examinations are tested pertaining to all COs, in varying Blooms Taxonomy Levels.
- Laboratory Records: Both continuous and semester-end examinations are conducted to test the COs attainment.

1. Indirect Assessment methods

- **Programme Exit survey** is taken from the final year students at the completion of their UG/PG programme, to get a comprehensive feedback for the PO/PSO assessment
- **Alumni Survey** is conducted annually through Google link or mail with the Alumni to obtain the inputs and suggestions on PO attainment in the real time societal environment
- **Employer Survey** is taken from the employer to measure the PO attainments.
- Projects, Internships, Assignments, are assessed and evaluated to achieve POs and Cos. Attainments of POs and COs are measured through direct and indirect assessments, which include both formative and summative methods.
- Monitoring and analyzing performance of students in University Semester-end examinations gives overall attainment perspective. For this purpose, each department analyses the results of the students in all such courses.
- In addition to acquisition of skills, increasing the knowledge & level of understanding, which are supposed to lead to behavioral change, the ultimate intended outcome of teaching-learning process is to imbibe the progressive change in the overall attitude. The attitude of the students, which is the supreme parameter, along with the changes in it are closely monitored by teachers throughout the programme for getting judgment of attainment of expected outcomes.
- Surveys of passing out students are taken and their feedbacks are collected. The college keeps track of the progress of alumni after completion of the programmes offered by it.

Two main achievements of alumni are focused upon, viz., their admission to other programmes of

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higher level of studies and their placements. These help in determining the COs and POs attainment levels in fuller depths.

The college organizes a number of extension activities to promote the institute-neighborhood community to sensitize the students towards community needs.

- Solar eclipse observatory.
- Hindi-Pakhwada, Marathi-Bhasha-Pandharwada to promote National languages.

he college runs effective **NSS and NCC** units. Through these units, the college undertakes various extension activities in the neighborhood community. By executing the **Unnat Bharat Abhiyan scheme** of the government of India the institution is connected with five villages of the region. **Swachha Yeshwant Cell** helps for green campus, both in YMN and outside, and other extension activities. The **Psycho-social Cell** offered extensive services to the people of the city during CoViD-19 Pandemic times.

- Through NSS and NCC units, the college undertakes various extension activities in the neighborhood community. The college operates a National Service Scheme (NSS) unit with a capacity of 250 students of whom 175 are boys and 75 are girls.
- With the involvement of NSS/NCC, the college organized events like blood donation camps, AIDS awareness campaigns, cleanliness drives in nearby localities, campus cleanliness, women's empowerment programs, road-safety-awareness programs etc.
- NSS organizes seven-day camp in a nearby adopted village and several activities were carried out by NSS volunteers addressing social issues which include cleanliness, tree-plantation, waterconservation through the construction of check dams (Bandhara), road construction, Shramdan, Social interaction, group discussion, Eradication of superstition, Beti-Bachao-Beti-Padhao, Environmental awareness, Women-empowerment, National Integrity, AIDS-awareness, Blooddonation camp, Health check-up camp, Veterinary guidance, Farmers' meet, awareness about farmer's suicide, etc.
- The NCC unit comprises of 52 cadets, of which 8 are girls. The NCC unit of the college organizes various extension activities such as tree-plantation, road-safety awareness, Save fuel-Save Country programme, Swachhta Abhiyan, and National Integrity awareness.
- Other than the NSS and NCC units, various departments of the college are conscious of their responsibilities for shaping students into responsible citizens of the country.
- Every year on the occasion of the birth and death anniversary of national leaders, the college organizes blood donation camp in association with NGOs and/or government organizations.
- During the CoViD-19 pandemic, several NSS/NCC students worked as volunteers and also distributed masks, sanitizer, and made the general public aware of the pandemic situation and severity.
- College has established Psycho-Social Cell comprising of five committees viz. Hospital information team, NGO information team, Psycho Social Team, Medicine information team and Emotional support team with two teachers and student volunteers, to provide Psycho social support during CoViD-19 pandemic crisis. College staff was assigned duties by District Collector, Nanded as CoViD Counsellors and in CoViD Control Room to support and monitor the local community and raise awareness about CoViD prevention and control.
- College implemented the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan of Ministry of Human Resource Development, New Delhi, by adopting five villages, Waghi, Pimpalgaon, Naleshwar, Rahati and Kottirth from Nanded district in the neighborhood for overall development of rural areas through active social

involvement and interventions.

- The Institution has two seminar halls and one Conference Hall which are well equipped with Laptop/LCD/ audio system, and ICT enabled CIC.
- Language-Lab 21 Computers, Commerce-Lab with 20 computers, 3 Computer-Labs each with 20 computers, Mathematics-Lab with 20 Computers, Student browsing center with 10 computers in the library for student use.

- The Institution has 30% of the class rooms and seminar halls well equipped with Laptop, LCD and audio system, smart classrooms, classrooms with LCD.
- A display panel at the entry point of the institution and a digital clock made by the students of Electronics under Incubation Centre.
- Every department has a Computer System and many departments have Printer.
- The Institution has 33 classrooms and 44 laboratories, 2 seminar halls, one Conference Hall, an auditorium, an amphi-theatre and 4 smart classrooms with smart board, 10 classrooms with LCD (one per PG programme), a display panel at the entry point of the institution and 397 computer systems many of which are connected with internet.

Bandwidth for Internet Connection:

The campus is internet connected. The available bandwidth of internet connection is 100 mbps. Periodic maintenance of the internet facility is made regularly as per need.

- Library has a separate internet connection with 2 mbps.
- The institution has four servers of higher configuration level- two for the library; one for the office administration and one for the maintenance of the three software of the college.

Departmental IT Facilities

- Most of the departments have been provided with computers linked with high speed internet and movable LCD and K-yan projectors which enable the preparation of educational materials, Power Point presentations and Video lectures which can be viewed through platforms like Cisco webex, Google class rooms, Google meet, Zoom meet and YouTube.
- The Science Departments are provided with Pen-tabs (07) for TLE.
- 160KW Solar panels On-Grid in the college campus and Solar water heater in the Girl's hostel are for Green Campus.
- 62KV Kirloskar Generator for power backup is functional on the campus.

• Most teachers use Laptops and Tabs for teaching and academic and administrative schedules.

- Group Insurance Policy is made available.
- Credit Cooperative Society helps teaching and non-teaching staff by providing instant need of short term loan urgent needs in the form of medical or festival or any other issues and long term loan for construction of houses, marriage of daughters, education loan, facilitates huge medical expenses.
- The college arranged Vaccination camps for students, faculty and staff during Covid times.
- The institution provides TA/ DA for participating and attending Conferences, Seminars, Workshops
- The Principal and teaching and non-teaching staff were constantly in touch with the society during the lock down and the former proactively arranged hospital beds and oxygen cylinders as needed.

Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff:

The institution has offline and online Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff. PBAS for the faculty is implemented as per the guidelines from UGC and State Government. Every year, the appraisal form of the faculty is submitted to the Principal through the respective HoD, duly verified by IQAC.

The institution conducts internal and external audits regularly: College has a Governing Body, Planning and Purchase Committee, Library and various associated bodies help in the preparation, division, allocation and utilization of funds.

UGC funds are deposited in a separate bank account. The utilization of these funds is ensured. Grants received for Non Granted Courses are used for academic and administrative purposes.

College has a well-defined financial and infrastructural development policy.

The Planning Committee decides the policy and procedure for purchasing any item. All purchases are done through a tender system. Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the bank. Only Principal and Management can operate the transaction through the bank. The accounts are maintained through electronic accounting using software.

Internal and External Financial Audits

Grant-in-Aid (GIA) is received from Government agencies like Directorate of Higher Education. The GIA is utilized for the purpose it is sanctioned for, like Salary, Books, purchase of Instruments, laboratory materials.

The books of accounts are maintained as per the norms laid down and are audited by the Internal Auditor.

The primary mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources is the proper sanction of expenditure by the designated authority, due procedure for incurring expenditure by authorized persons, and maintenance of books of accounts by the accounts section of the college. This mechanism is supervised by the Principal of the college, and the Governing Body. Books of accounts are duly audited Records of all the purchased items are maintained electronically in software, Accession–Stock Management System (ASMS) developed by the institution.

The accounts of the College are audited regularly as per the Government norms. **An internal auditor, Kulkarni and Associates,** audits the accounts every month.

The audit objections are put in College Development Committee (CDC), discussed and settled.

The external auditor, Ms. Fallore conducts statutory audit at the end of every financial year.

External audit is also done by Government in three tier system (Sr. Admin officer, Sr. Auditor, JD office, and AG), who audit the entire books of Account and does the Para Settling; which is then settled by the Institution.

Main aim of forming CIC is to offer research benefit to students of this institution, other institutions and

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other stakeholders such as farmers across Maharashtra.

CIC lab equipment allows students to interact directly with the research data compiled. Students and researchers get a first-hand learning experience by performing various experiments on their own.

These instruments in CIC are purchased under UGC-CPE, DST, BSR and College funds. The Lab technician of CIC is an M. Tech. qualified; the maintenance and manpower is funded by college.

The Departments of Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Electronics and Computer Science and the in-charge department of CIC, annually conduct Instrumentation-Hands-On Training to students. The workshop focuses on two aspects: to enhance the practical knowledge of students; and to use research facility and instruments by both faculty and students for their technical development.

Soil-Testing-Unit of the CIC: Nanded, being an agrarian part of Maharashtra, the institution established **Soil-Testing-Unit under CIC on the campus** to help the farmers around the region.

- To test the Acidic and Alkaline levels in the Soil;
- To test the flow of Electricity in the Soil;
- To test the Organic Carbon in the Soil;
- To test the Single Super Phosphate (P2O5), Murate Potash (K2O) level in the Soil;
- To test the micro-elements like Manganese (Mn), Zinc (Zn), Ferrous (Fe), and Copper (Cu) in the soil.

The Soil Testing Unit of Yeshwant Mahavidyalaya, Nanded is in association with the **Land Fertility Testing Program of the Maharashtra Government** and the Soil samples through 'National Agricultural Development Scheme' from various villages belonging to the Talukas of Nanded and neighboring districts are tested for measuring different parameters. Accordingly the suggestions are prescribed for efficient use of the concerned land areas. The outcome is scientific understanding of the nature of the soil which helps in determining a better use of it in the Districts of Nanded and neighboring districts.

The farmers who have taken suggested measures have reported the increased yield of their land. The balance of the Soil Testing Unit as on 31-03-2022 is Rs. 17, 07, 578.00.

The college has set up an **Incubation Centre** for advanced research and engaging fast learners.

The outcome of the CIC:
